Ringing Report: Bailey's Farm

January – December 2019



Yellowhammer (Emberiza citrinella)

Introduction

This report covers ringing activities undertaken at Bailey's Farm between January and December 2019. Ringing was undertaken by Jonathan Cooper as part of the West Wilts Ringing Group. The site is located within the grid refence square ST9775; close to the village of East Tytherton. The area comprises of mainly tilled farmland with a variety of crops sown, field boundaries consists of large mature hedgerows. The map below shows the sites location and where nets rides are placed (blue lines).

Catch Summary

Across the year a total of 11 sessions were undertaken; these were spread across the year. In total 606 new birds were ringed and 137 re-captures were processed. The sessions on February 8th was an evening session drag netting for Skylark. On average 55 new birds and 12 re-captures were processed per session. Overall 23 species were caught. Table 1 on the following page shows a breakdown of the catch by species and session, table 2 compares 2019 to previous years totals.

Discussion

2019 provided several good catches for the site adding 6 new species to the sites ringed list. These were: Skylark, Starling, House Sparrow, Grey Wagtail, Meadow Pipit and Linnet. The Skylark were a personal highlight, not only being a first for the site but also a first ringed for me personally.

Once again good numbers of Chaffinch were caught along with 88 Redwing. This is an unprecedented number and includes 44 in caught in one session. However, the real highlight is the numbers of Greenfinch caught on site this year. 104 new and 1 re-trap represents 60% of the totals number caught ion 2019 for the West Wilts Ringing Group. Hopefully this signals a recovery in numbers after the species was hit by the Trichomoniasis parasite. One negative is the numbers of Yellowhammer, these have decreased by over 50% compared to 2018. There is no obvious reason for this decline of this red-listed species; it may be a temporary blip in numbers or be a symptom of birds moving around the landscape to find food.

Ringing Recoveries

In 2019, there were 3 birds ringed elsewhere and re-captured on site and 3 bird ringed on site and recovered elsewhere. Table 3 outlines the details of birds ringed elsewhere and re-captured at Meadow Farm. Table 4 shows details of birds ringed at Meadow Farm and re-captured elsewhere.
