Ringing Report: Meadow Farm

January – December 2019



Kingfisher (Alcedo atthis)

Introduction

This report covers ringing activities undertaken at Meadow Farm between January and December 2019. Ringing was undertaken by Jonathan Cooper as part of the West Wilts Ringing Group. The site is located within the grid refence square ST9577, outside of Chippenham and close to the village of Sutton Benger. The area comprises of a rich mix of habitats including grassland, woodland, river, scrub and a small area of reedbed and wetland and is adjacent to areas of arable farmland. The site falls partially within the County Wildlife Site of the River Avon. The map below shows the sites location and the nets rides (blue lines).

Catch Summary

Across the year a total of 20 sessions were undertaken; these were spread across the year. In total 909 new birds were ringed and 420 re-captures were processed. On average 45 new birds and 21 recaptures were processed per session. Overall 30 species were caught. Table 1 on the following page shows a breakdown of the catch by species and session, table 2 compares 2019 to previous years totals.

Discussion

2019 was an exceptional year for the site, producing a wholly unpreceded number of large catches of a variety of species. The increased in ringing in the summer months and overall more sessions also helps explain the increase seen since 2018. This year 7 new species were ringed on site. These were: Woodpigeon, Coal Tlt,Cetti's Warbler, Whitethroat, Song Thrush, Grey Wagtail and Reed Bunting. The Grey Wagtail was the standout bird for me; not only a first for the site but also a first personally ringed.

Many species were caught in higher numbers than expected in 2019; for example: Reed Warbler, Blackcap, Goldfinch and Redwing. However, the stand-out species in terms of numbers caught is Greenfinch. 57 new and 4 re-captures represent 30% of the whole catch for the West Wilts ringing group in 2019. The numbers at the site have exploded this year; a welcome return after the numbers fell sharply as a result of the Trichomoniasis parasite. 11 new Kingfishers is another excellent total; showing how many birds can use a small area of habitat.

Ringing Recoveries

In 2019, there were 6 birds ringed elsewhere and re-captured on site and 6 bird ringed on site and recovered elsewhere. Table 3 outlines the details of birds ringed elsewhere and re-captured at Meadow Farm. Table 4 shows details of birds ringed at Meadow Farm and re-captured elsewhere.
